
Mr. Easthope's Pick: "Fifteen Dogs" by Andre Alexis. A Giller Prize winner.

Ms. Quaal's Pick: "The Giver" - by Lois Lowry. Young Adult Fiction. Dystopian Fantasy.

Mrs. Fleetham's Pick: "The Book Thief" by Markus Zusak. Historical Fiction. Death is personified and takes a feature role in this novel set during the holocaust.

Mrs. Kolotylo's Pick: "A Lucky Child" by Thomas Buergenthal. Non-Fiction. A memoir of a 10 year old boy who survives Auschwitz.



#### **Middle Years Index**

For a number of years our grade 4 students have participated in the MDI survey. This year the survey will be given to gr. 5s across the province.

The MDI uses a strengthsbased approach to assess five areas of development that are strongly linked to well-being, health and academic achievement. In addition, the MDI focuses on highlighting the promotive and protective factors and assets that are known to support and optimize development in middle childhood. These areas are: Social and Emotional Development, Physical Health and Well-Being, Connectedness, Use of After-School Time and School Experiences.

We just received the results from last year's survey and feel really encouraged by how our students responded to questions regarding their experiences at M.V. Beattie. 89% of our students reported that they have connections to 2 or more important adults at school - which is 16% greater than rest of our district.

## Health, Safety & Goodwill



No doubt we have all started to become more aware of the truth expressed by this poster. We rely on each other in good times and even more so when challenges arise. This is true throughout our past, in our current predicament and will undoubtedly be true in the future as well.

We wanted to thank our M.V. Beattie community for working hard to follow the Covid protocols. **We are doing our best at school and at home.** However, in an effort to be prepared for what to do in case of an "exposure" in our MVB community, I wanted to share what we have learned about this process.

**First.** Parents/Guardians and their children will always be the first to know about a positive test.

**Second.** Interior Health will determine who needs to be informed. They take the lead. It appears that the school may or may not be informed due to their determination about what risk/exposure was present - and to whom.

**Third.** Once it has been determined by IHA that an exposure has occurred, they will begin the process of contact tracing. It is possible that a few students/staff may receive contact or perhaps an entire division. We will be given our marching orders by IHA. They will determine who needs to be in isolation and for how long.

**Fourth.** Communication home about "exposures" will come from the School District and/or M.V. Beattie - but will have to adhere to a legal expectation regarding people's rights to privacy.

# Middle Years Index cont...

97% of students responded positively to questions regarding "school climate," which is described as "the overall tone of the school environment, including the way teachers and students interact and how students treat each other. e.g., 'People care about each other in this school."

**89%** of students responded positively to questions regarding school belonging, which is defined "the degree to which children feel connected and valued at their school. e.g., 'I feel like I am important to this school."

While there is always room for improvement, the importance of positive relationships among students and the strong connections that they feel to our staff lay a great foundation for the hard work that we need to continue to focus on.

We have always been proud of our students and community, but this feedback helps us to determine which assets are currently in place - and which areas to focus upon. **Finally.** We will ask for your help in reducing levels of anxiety. That means our focus will be on compassion and support - and not on seeking someone to blame.

#### **A Few Other Reminders/Changes:**

- 1.Please have your children arrive and depart from school as close to the bell times as possible.
- 2. When dropping off/picking up, please do your best to avoid congregating in groups.
- 3. We are starting to have parent volunteers in our classrooms or helping with field trips thank you for following the covid protocol! Speak to your child's teacher for more info about opportunities to volunteer.
- 4. Icy road conditions. As you have discovered, our drop off/pick up can be treacherous. Please make sure to drive slowly and not park in the Kiss and Go Lane...it creates difficult sight-lines and we have had a few close calls.
